Series Notables:

- * The Cowboys and Raiders have met 11 times with Oakland holding a 6-5 advantage.
- * Oakland is one-of-seven teams that Dallas does not hold a series advantage over, joining Baltimore, Cleveland, Denver, Green Bay, Jacksonville (series tied) and Miami (series tied).
- * Only Jacksonville (six), Baltimore (five) and Houston (four) have faced the Cowboys fewer than the 11 times Oakland has. Dallas has also faced Kansas City and the LA Chargers 11 times each.
- * Eight of the 11 games have been decided by seven points-or-less.

A Cowboys Win Would:

- * Up Dallas' win streak to three games - tied for the longest streak of the season.
- * Close out the Cowboys 2017 record against the AFC West at 2-2, and up it to 24-23 overall.
- * Snap a two-game losing streak in Oakland and serve as Dallas' first win there since the 1995 season (11/19).
- * Serve as Dallas' 32nd win on Sunday Night Football, most all-time.

★ JERRY JONES ★ Owner/President/General Manager, 1989-Present 2017 Pro Football Hall of Fame Inductee

Recognized around the NFL as one of his era's most influential and passionate owners, Jerry Jones was selected for induction to the Pro Football Hall of Fame as a contributor in February of 2017 and completed his trek to Canton with the unveiling of his Hall of Fame bust and induction ceremony on August 5, 2017.

In addition to becoming the first NFL owner to lead his franchise to three Super Bowl titles (1992, 93 and 95) in a four year period of time, Jones' efforts in the areas of sports marketing, promotion, stadium development, and network television negotiations created a lasting imprint on the landscape of the NFL and the American sports culture.

Since his purchase of the Cowboys in 1989, the team has won 10 division titles, while advancing to the postseason 14 times and reaching the NFC Championship game four times.

As Dallas' general manager, Jones has overseen personnel efforts that include the acquisition of 47 different players who have combined for a collective total of 142 Pro Bowl appearances. Six Cowboys players from Jones' tenure of ownership have been inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame -- Troy Aikman, Michael Irvin, Emmitt Smith, Deion Sanders, Larry Allen and Charles Haley - while Jones has served as the presenter for three of those men: Irvin, Smith and Allen.

The lasting landmarks to Jones' legacy of promoting and protecting the future of the sport of football can be seen in the conception and construction of AT&T Stadium in Arlington, Texas and The Star in Frisco, Texas. The stadium, which opened in 2009, has a capacity of over 100,000 and is the largest and most technologically sound indoor/outdoor stadium in the world. The Star, which serves as the world training headquarters for the Dallas Cowboys, is a state-of-the-art venue that enjoys a first-of-its-kind partnership with its surrounding community in Frisco, Texas, and the young men and women who compete in athletics at the high school and youth sports levels.

On the league level, Jones has served lengthy stints on nearly every significant NFL ownership committee, including the Competition Committee, the Broadcast Committee, the Management Council's Executive Committee, the Health and Safety Advisory Committee, and he is currently the chairman of the NFL Network and Pro Football Hall of Fame Committees.

Born on October 13, 1942, Jones' connections to the game of football go back to his playing days at North Little Rock High School. He then earned a scholarship to play at the University of Arkansas where he was a co-captain of the 1964 Razorbacks' national championship team.

Jones, who became the 15th NFL owner to be selected for induction into the Hall of Fame, is the only man in football history to both play for a collegiate national championship football team and own a Super Bowl winning club.

Jones was born on Oct. 13, 1942 in Los Angeles, Calif.

Player Spotlight

4 DAK PRESCOTT

★ Dak Prescott threw three touchdown passes on Sunday against the Giants, giving him eight career games with at least three touchdowns through the air. In his career, Prescott has posted 44 passing touchdowns to only 13 interceptions, a TD/INT ratio of 3.38, which ranks second all-time among quarterbacks with at least 500 pass attempts:

★ Prescott completed three passes for 50-plus yards in New York (50t, 54, 81t), joining Seattle's Russell Wilson (51t, 54, 61 vs. HOU) as the only two quarterbacks in 2017 to complete three passes for 50-plus yards in the same game.

★ Prescott is only the eighth quarterback since the 1970 merger to post multiple games (2) with 300 passing yards, three scoring throws and no interceptions in his first two NFL seasons, joining Dan Marino (3), Derek Carr (2), Tony Eason (2), Jeff Garcia (2), Jared Goff (2), Trevor Siemian (2), and Kurt Warner (2).

BY THE NUMBERS



20 After scoring 21 points in the fourth quarter against Washington, and scoring 20 points in the fourth quarter against the N.Y. Giants, the Cowboys have scored 20-plus points in the fourth quarter of back-to-back games for the first time in franchise history.

113 Rod Smith became the first player in NFL history to have both an 80-plus yard touchdown reception and a rushing touchdown in the fourth quarter of a single game, taking a pass from Prescott 81 yards for a touchdown and then scoring on a 15-yard rush later in the final quarter at New York. Smith's 113 receiving yards in the game are the ninth most by a Cowboys running back.

222 The Cowboys offense recorded 222 yards after the catch in Sunday's win at the N.Y. Giants, the seventh-highest total league-wide in 2017 and the fourth-highest by a Cowboys offense since 1992 (265 - 11/22/12 vs. WAS; 251 - 10/6/13 vs. DEN; 231 - 12/29/13 vs. PHI).

500 The Cowboys earned their 500th regular season win at New York, becoming the second-fastest team to reach 500 wins in 879 games, trailing only Chicago's 863 games. The victory gave Jerry Jones his 250th regular season win as the Dallas Cowboys Owner, President and General Manager since purchasing the team in 1989.

2017 RANKINGS AND UPCOMING MILESTONES

With the 2017 season in its home stretch, the following information pertains to the most current team rankings, upcoming milestones, last week's notes and page location in the release for the remainder of the information:

2017 DALLAS COWBOYS CURRENT TEAM RANKINGS:

- * The Dallas rushing attack ranks third in the NFL with an average of 137.5 rushing yards-per-game. The Cowboys are also tops in the league with 105 rushing first downs and are third with 16 rushing touchdowns. (**RUSHING TO THE TOP - page 15**).
- * The Cowboys have 50 big-play runs of 10-or-more yards to tie for second in the league. Dallas also has 10 rushes of 20+ yards to tie for eighth (**RUSHING TO THE TOP - page 15**).
- * The Dallas offense boasts 23 drives of five-or-more minutes - tied for third in the NFL in 2017. The unit also has posted the most touchdowns (12) and second-most points (97) during drives of five-or-more minutes (**DRIVE FOR FIVE - page 15**).
- * The Cowboys offense has racked up 24 total drives of 10 plays-or-more - tied for 10th in the NFL. Additionally, the unit's 12 touchdowns on those drives are tied for the league lead, while their 100 total points are fourth (**TEN PLAYS-OR-MORE - page 15**).
- * The Dallas offense has scored on 53 of its 140 drives for a 37.9% scoring efficiency rate to place ninth in the NFL, while boasting the fourth-highest touchdown efficiency rate (26.4%) and boasts the third-most touchdown drives (37) (**FINISHING DRIVES WITH SCORES - page 15**).
- * The Cowboys have the fourth-highest red zone touchdown efficiency rate in the NFL (63.0), while their 29 touchdowns in the red zone are fourth and 230 total points rank sixth (**RED ALERT - page 15**).
- * Dallas' offense is fourth in the league with a 44.8 third down percentage (74-of-165) (**THIRD-AND-NO PROBLEM - page 15**).
- * The Cowboys defense has collected 32.0 sacks to tie for 13th in the league (**SACK ATTACK - page 21**).

2017 DALLAS COWBOYS CURRENT INDIVIDUAL RANKINGS:

- * QB Dak Prescott is tied for 10th in the NFL in passing touchdowns (21) (**DAKOTA THE DUDE - page 10**).
- * Prescott's five rushing touchdowns are tied for the most by a quarterback in the NFL in 2017 (**RAYNE MAN - page 11**).
- * DE DeMarcus Lawrence is second in the NFL with 13.5 sacks (**TANK ON A ROLL - page 21**).
- * P Chris Jones is tied for second in the NFL with 29 punts downed inside the opponent's 20-yard line (**THE PUNT-ISHER - page 23**).
- * KR Ryan Switzer ranks third in the NFL with a 26.0 average and is sixth with 519 kickoff return yards. He is also sixth overall in total return yardage (716) - all tops among rookies (**SWITZ BEATZ - page 23**).

2017 DALLAS COWBOYS UPCOMING MILESTONES - INDIVIDUAL:

Dez Bryant - WR

- * Dez Bryant (currently at 61) needs nine receptions to reach 70 catches on the season for the fourth time of his career - first since 2014 - and the third-most 70-reception seasons in team history.
- * Bryant (currently at 712) needs 88 yards to reach 800 receiving yards on the season for the fifth time of his career - first since 2014 - and tie the fifth-most seasons with 800 receiving yards by a Cowboy in franchise history.
- * Bryant (currently at 452) needs five points to top Bob Hayes (456) for fifth all-time in total points in team history.
- * Bryant (currently at 73) needs two touchdowns to become the 34th player in NFL history to reach 75 career receiving touchdowns.

Jeff Heath - S

- * Jeff Heath (currently at two) needs one interception to extend his career-long streak of consecutive games with a pick to three.

Chris Jones - P

- * Chris Jones (currently at 29) needs two punts downed inside the 20-yard line to surpass his own career-best of 30 set in 2013 and tie Toby Gowin (31 - 1998) for the second-best performance during a single season in team history.
- * Jones (currently at 142) needs three punts downed inside the opponents' 20-yard line to surpass Danny White (144) for third on the club's all-time career list.

DeMarcus Lawrence - DE

- * DeMarcus Lawrence (13.5) needs one sack to pass Jim Jeffcoat (1986) and DeMarcus Ware (2007) - both with 14.0 - for the fourth-most sacks in a single season in team history. With 2.0 sacks he ties Ware (15.5 - 2010) for third (**TANK ON A ROLL - page 21**).

Sean Lee - LB

- * Sean Lee (currently at 82) needs 18 tackles to reach 100 for the fifth time of his career - third consecutive (**FOLLOW THE LEE-DER - page 21**).

Dak Prescott - QB

- * Dak Prescott (currently at 6,419) needs 137 yards to surpass Steve Pelluer (6,555) for seventh on the club's all-time passing yards list (**THE DAK KNIGHT RISES - page 11**).
- * Prescott (currently at 2,752) needs 249 yards to reach 3,000 passing yards on the 2017 season. By doing so, he would become the fifth Dallas quarterback to pass for 3,000 yards in at least two seasons. He also would become the fifth quarterback - seventh time - to reach that mark in at least two consecutive seasons.
- * By reaching 3,000 yards on the season, he would also become the first quarterback in franchise history to pass for at least 3,000 yards in each of his first two seasons, and the 11th signal caller in NFL history to do so.
- * Prescott (currently at 44) needs two touchdowns to surpass Eddie LeBaron (45) for seventh on the club's all-time passing touchdowns list (**THE DAK KNIGHT RISES - page 11**).
- * Prescott (currently at 21) needs three touchdown passes to top his rookie total of 23 in 2016 and establish a career-high.
- * Prescott (currently at eight) needs one game with at least three touchdown passes and one-or-fewer interceptions to tie Dan Marino (nine) for the most by an NFL quarterback in his first two seasons.
- * Prescott (currently at five) needs two rushing touchdowns to surpass his 2016 total (six) for the most rushing scores by a Cowboys quarterback during a single season in franchise history (**RAYNE MAN - page 11**).
- * Prescott (currently at 288) needs 12 yards to become the fourth quarterback in team history - sixth time overall - to rush for 300 yards in a single season, and the first time since Troy Aikman (302) in 1989.
- * With 15 yards (currently at 288) he will pass Troy Aikman (302 - 1989) for fifth; with 27 he passes Steve Pelluer (314 - 1988) for fourth; with 29 yards he moves into third place over Roger Staubach (316 - 1975); with 33 he tops Staubach's 1974 total (320) for second; with 56 he overtakes Staubach's 1971 performance (343) for the most rushing yards by a Dallas quarterback in a single season.
- * Prescott (currently at 519) needs 51 rushing yards to pass Tony Romo (620) for the fifth-most career rushing yards by a Dallas quarterback (**RAYNE MAN - page 11**).

Jaylon Smith - LB

- * Jaylon Smith (currently at 94) needs six tackles to reach 100 for the season for the first time of his career (**JAYLON'S "CLEAR EYE VIEW" - page 21**).

Jason Witten - TE

- * Jason Witten (currently at 457) needs 43 receiving yards to reach 500 yards on the season for the 14th season of his career to become the 10th player - second tight end - in NFL history to reach that mark in at least 14 seasons. He would also become the fifth player - second tight end - to post at least 500 receiving yards in 14 consecutive seasons (**500x13 - page 18**).
- * Witten (currently at 52) needs eight receptions to give him 60 on the season for his 14th overall season to become the third player in NFL history - second tight end - to reach that mark in at least 14 seasons and serve as the third-most most seasons with 60-plus receptions in league history by any player. He would also become the second player - second tight end - to post 60 receptions in at least 14 consecutive seasons (**50x14 - page 17**).

2017 MOST RECENT NOTES - AT N.Y. GIANTS (12/10)

2017 DALLAS COWBOYS MOST RECENT NOTES AT N.Y. GIANTS (12/10) - TEAM:

- * The Cowboys earned their 500th regular season win to become the 12th team to reach that number, and reached that mark in 879 games, trailing only Chicago's 863 games for the fastest. Overall, Dallas owns a 500-373-6 record (regular season) (**GETTING TO FIVE HUNDRED - page 6**).
- * The win also served as Dallas' 21st series sweep - most against any opponent, the first over the Giants since the 2014 season and the first time since the 2013 season the Cowboys swept two NFC East opponents in the same season (Washington).
- * It also ended a two-game losing streak in New York to mark the club's first win there since the 2014 season (11/23).
- * The Cowboys improved their record in the NFC East to 4-1, and 6-4 overall in the NFC.
- * Dallas' passing attack averaged 11.1 yards-per-attempt, the highest since at the N.Y. Giants (11/14/10).
- * The Cowboys posted 454 total net yards - the second-highest by the team in 2017.
- * Dallas had three plays of 50 yards-or-more - the most since 1994, the longest this stat can be researched at this time.

2017 DALLAS COWBOYS MOST RECENT NOTES AT N.Y. GIANTS (12/10) - INDIVIDUAL:

Jerry Jones - Owner, President & GM

- * The victory gave Jerry Jones his 250th regular season win as the Dallas Cowboys Owner, President and General Manager since purchasing the team in 1989. The Cowboys are now 250-211 under Jones' ownership in the regular season.

Dan Bailey - K

- * Dan Bailey's two field goal attempts allowed him to become the 102nd player in NFL history - second Dallas Cowboy (Rafael Septien - 226) - to attempt 200 for his career (201).

Cole Beasley - WR

- * Cole Beasley caught three passes for 59 yards, including a career-long catch of 54 yards in the fourth quarter that set up Dallas' go-ahead touchdown.

Dez Bryant - WR

- * Dez Bryant caught three passes for 73 yards and a touchdown.
- * Bryant's 73 receiving yards gave him 7,333 for his career to surpass Bob Hayes (7,295) for fifth all-time in team history (**BY DEZIGN - page 19**).
- * Bryant (1,000) became the fifth Cowboy to record 1,000 career receiving yards against the Giants.
- * Bryant's three receptions gave him 61 on the season to give him his fifth career season with at least 60 receptions - first since 2014 - and are good for the third-most all-time in team history (**88 GOOD FOR 60 - page 20**).
- * Bryant's 50-yard touchdown reception in the second quarter marked his 10th career score to travel over 50 yards. He is the fourth Cowboy to post 10-or-more receiving touchdowns over 50 yards, joining Frank Clarke, Bob Hayes and Michael Irvin. It was also his longest since he hauled in another 50-yarder at Pittsburgh (11/13/16) (**BRYANT GOES THE DISTANCE - page 20**).

Sean Lee

- * Sean Lee recorded his fifth career 20-tackle game with 20 stops (according to coaches film) against the Giants (**FOLLOW THE LEADER - page 21**).

Dak Prescott - QB

- * Dak Prescott completed 20-of-30 passes for a career-high 332 yards with three touchdowns and no interceptions for a 137.1 rating - fourth-highest of his career.
- * It was Prescott's eighth career game with at least three touchdown passes - sixth-most in team history. It was also his 15th career game with at least two passing scores to break a tie with Eddie LeBaron for seventh (**QB'S MULTIPLE TDs - page 10**).
- * Prescott's three touchdown passes gave him 21 on the season to become the fifth quarterback in team history to post at least two 20-touchdown seasons, and he was also the fifth Cowboys signal caller - sixth time - to reach that mark in consecutive seasons (**IN HIS EARLY TWENTIES - page 12**).
- * Prescott rushed for 13 yards on six carries to top his 2016 rushing yards total (282) and establish a career-high (288) for the sixth-highest rushing output by a Cowboys quarterback in a single season (**RAYNE MAN - page 11**).

Rod Smith - RB

- * Rod Smith rushed six times for 47 yards and a touchdown, and caught five passes for 113 yards - both career-highs - and his first career receiving touchdown, a career-long 81-yard catch and score.
- * Smith caught only the fourth career touchdown pass from Prescott to a running back, and he became the first not named Ezekiel Elliott. Smith became the ninth Cowboy running back - 14th time - to notch a 100-yard receiving game, and the first since Lance Dunbar totaled 100 yards against Atlanta (9/27/15) (**LIGHTNING ROD - page 14**).

HEAD COACHES

JASON GARRETT (66-54, 7th Year)

Jason Garrett was named the eighth head coach in Dallas Cowboys history on January 5, 2011. Garrett became the first former Dallas Cowboys player to become the team's head coach. As a backup quarterback during his playing career in Dallas, he started nine-of-23 games played and was a member of teams that won six division titles and three Super Bowl championships.

Garrett was elevated to the Cowboys top job after taking over as the team's interim head coach midway through 2010. He guided the club to a 5-3 mark to finish the season after the team started 1-7. He led Dallas to an 8-8 record, narrowly missing the playoffs and an NFC East Division title in each his first three full seasons as head coach (2011-13). Garrett guided the 2014 squad to an NFL-best tying 12-4 record, the club's 22nd Division title - 18th NFC East title - 31st postseason appearance and 34th playoff win. His team fought through adversity in 2015, especially on the injury front where they endured injuries to Tony Romo, Dez Bryant and Orlando Scandrick amongst others, while slipping to 4-12 on the season. The team bounced back under Garrett in 2016, completing the club's largest one-season turnaround in franchise history with a nine-game difference, finishing with a 13-3 record in 2016. The record included beginning the season 0-1 and going on to win 11 straight games - the longest single-season win streak in team history. Garrett's Cowboys won their second division championship with him at the helm, while earning the NFC's top overall seed and hosting an NFC Divisional Playoff Game for the first time since 2007. He was named AP Coach of the Year for his team's 2016 accomplishments.

From 2007-13, when Garrett was brought on as the Cowboys offensive coordinator, the unit finished among the NFL's top-10 in total offense in five of his seven years at the helm: 2013 (10th), 2012 (6th), 2010 (10th), 2009 (2nd) and 2007 (2nd). The team has set single-season records in a handful of categories, including topping 6,000 net yards for the first four times in franchise history (2009- 6,390; 2011 - 6,008; 2014 - 6,138 and 2016 - 6,027). Since his arrival in 2007, not only has the team set single-season records in numerous offensive categories, but the club's cumulative numbers for gross passing yards (39,993) and total points (3,919) represent the best totals over a 10-year span in the history of the organization while the club's 58,567 total net yards are second.

JACK DEL RIO (97-95, 13th Year, 25-21 OAK)

Jack Del Rio was named the 19th head coach in Oakland Raiders history on January 15, 2015 and is in his 32nd year in the NFL, 21st season coaching and third season with the Raiders. Last year he led the Raiders to their first 12-win season since 2000 and first postseason berth since 2002. Following the team's appearance in the Wild Card Playoffs, an NFL-high seven Raiders were named to the AFC Pro Bowl squad, two earned spots on the Associated Press All-Pro First-Team and Khalil Mack was named Defensive Player of the Year. In Del Rio's first season with the Raiders in 2015, he helped the team more than double the previous year's win total. He joined the Raiders after spending three seasons (2012-14) as the Denver Broncos defensive coordinator. While with the Broncos, Del Rio was part of three-straight AFC West titles and helped lead Denver to an appearance in Super Bowl XLVIII following the 2013 campaign. Del Rio was interim head coach (weeks 10-13) in 2013 while John Fox underwent a heart procedure, posting a 3-1 record. Prior to joining the Broncos in 2012, Del Rio spent nine seasons at the helm in Jacksonville. During his head coaching tenure (2003-11), the Jaguars made two playoff appearances in 2005 and 2007, highlighted by the club's first postseason win in eight seasons with a victory against Pittsburgh in a 2007 AFC Wild Card Game. His defenses have ranked in the top-six in the NFL in yards-per-game allowed in 10 of his 20 seasons as a position coach, coordinator or head coach. During that time, Del Rio has coached 28 players to a total of 40 Pro Bowl selections. He served as Carolina's defensive coordinator in 2002, and as linebackers coach for Baltimore (1999-2001). Del Rio began his coaching career with the New Orleans Saints under Head Coach Mike Ditka, serving as an assistant strength coach in 1997 before moving on to coach the linebackers in 1998. A veteran of 11 seasons as an NFL linebacker, he was selected in the third round (68th overall) of the 1985 NFL Draft by New Orleans and went on to make the NFL's All-Rookie Team and earn the Saints Rookie of the Year award. Following two seasons in New Orleans (1985-86), he played for Kansas City (1987-88), Dallas (1989-91) and Minnesota (1992-95). He led the Vikings in tackles for three consecutive years and was selected to the Pro Bowl in 1994. For his career, he played 160 games in the regular season and totaled 1,078 tackles, 12.0 sacks and 13 interceptions.

GETTING TO FIVE HUNDRED

The win also served as Jerry Jones' 250th regular season win as the Dallas Cowboys Owner, President and General Manager:

WINNING HEAD COACH

Under Dallas Cowboys Head Coach Jason Garrett's direction, the team secured its second NFC East divisional title with a 13-3 record in 2016, and he was named AP Coach of the Year. He also had an 11-game win streak to establish the longest single-season win streak in franchise history. Garrett won his 50th regular season game at Green Bay (10/16/16) to become only the second head coach in franchise history to reach 50 wins. He tied his personal best with the club's 12th win of the season against Tampa Bay (12/18/16) - tied the second-most wins by a Cowboys head coach. It also marked Garrett's second 12-win season to give him the third-most 12-plus win seasons by a Dallas head coach. He then bettered his personal-best with his 13th win against Detroit (12/26/16), while tying Jimmy Johnson (1992) and Wade Phillips (2007) for the most wins by a Cowboys head coach in a single season.

Garrett wrapped up the 2014 regular season with a record of 12-4 - the fifth coach to reach 12 wins-or-better in a season in team history. He also secured his first NFC East Division title as the head coach. Against the N.Y. Giants (10/19/14), Garrett passed former head coaches Bill Parcells and Phillips (both with 34) with his 35th regular season win to place fourth in team history. He passed Barry Switzer (40) for third with his 41st victory at Washington (12/28/14), then tied Johnson (44) for the second-most victories at Miami (11/22/15), and passed Johnson at Washington (12/7/15).

Including his 7-6 record in the 2017 season, Garrett's current regular season record as the head coach of the Dallas Cowboys stands at 65-52, with the second-most wins all-time in team history:

SUNDAY NIGHT LIGHTS

This week's game against the Oakland Raiders is Dallas' last-of-three scheduled Sunday night contests in 2017.

No team in the NFL has played more Sunday Night games than Dallas' 62 (N.Y. Giants are closest with 52), and Dallas' 31 wins are the most on Sunday Night by any team.

The Cowboys had a six-game Sunday Night win streak - the longest Sunday night win streak in club history - snapped in 2009. Twice, Dallas won three straight - their first three Sunday Night games and three games spanning 1991-1995. The Cowboys lost eight consecutive Sunday Night games - six on the road - from 1999-2006 for their longest series losing streak. The Cowboys won three-of-four Sunday Night contests in 2016, and are 1-1 in 2017 on SNF.

Dallas has played 32 Sunday Night road games (14-18). This week's matchup marks the second time the Cowboys will meet the Raiders on Sunday night, and the first since the 1983 season.

Dallas has faced the N.Y. Giants (13 times) more than any other opponent.

The Cowboys finished the 2014 regular season with an undefeated 8-0 record on the road - the only squad with a perfect mark away from home in the NFL. The Cowboys eight road wins were the most in team history during the regular season since the NFL began a 16-game schedule. They were the second team in franchise history to win all road games in a season, joining the 1968 team, which won all seven of its road games during a 14-game season. In NFL history, they were the sixth team since the 1970 NFL merger to form a perfect 8-0 record on the road, joining the 2007 New England Patriots, the 2001 St. Louis Rams, the 1984, 1989 and the 1990 San Francisco 49ers.

Dallas continued its road victory streak into 2015, winning the first contest away from home at Philadelphia (9/20) before falling to the Saints at New Orleans (10/4) in overtime, ending the road run. Dating back to the Cowboys final road game of the 2013 season at Washington (12/22), Dallas won 10 consecutive regular season road games to tie a franchise-high with both the 2006-07 and 1968-69 squads for the longest road win streak in team history.

SOLD OUT STADIUMS

The Cowboys have played in front of sold out stadiums in 452 of their last 454 games (including playoffs) and in 254 consecutive games. They played in front of sold out crowds in 153 consecutive games at Texas Stadium (including playoffs) - dating back to Dec. 16, 1990 against Phoenix, their last home non-sellout. Dallas opened what is now named AT&T Stadium with the largest crowd to witness a regular season NFL game with 105,121 tickets distributed and have 74 straight sellouts (including playoffs). The Cowboys have sold out each of their last 226 home games.

DAK TO THE FUTURE

The Dallas Cowboys selected Rayne Dakota "Dak" Prescott in the fourth round of the 2016 NFL Draft (135th overall). Following injuries at the quarterback position during the preseason to Kellen Moore and Tony Romo that opened the way for him to start, Prescott never looked back, setting multiple franchise rookie quarterback records along the way. He started all 16 games of the 2016 season for Dallas to become the first rookie quarterback drafted in the fourth round-or-later in NFL history to accomplish that feat, while his 13-3 record is the best in franchise history by a rookie and tied the most wins by an NFL rookie in league history.

Amongst league quarterbacks in 2016, Prescott finished the regular season ranked third in quarterback rating (104.9) and fourth in completion percentage (67.8) and yards-per-attempt (7.99), while completing 311-of-459 passes for 3,667 yards with 23 touchdowns and four interceptions. He led all NFL rookies in wins (13), completion percentage, passing touchdowns, rating, rushing touchdowns (six) and rushing yards (282) en route to becoming the first Cowboys quarterback to be named the Associated Press Offensive Rookie of the Year.

THE BOOK OF EZEKIEL

For only the second time in franchise history, the Dallas Cowboys used a top-five pick on a running back when they chose Ezekiel Elliott out of Ohio State with the fourth overall selection in the 2016 NFL Draft. Dallas selected Tony Dorsett with the second pick in the 1977 NFL Draft.

Elliott led the NFL in yards (1,631), attempts (322) and runs of 10-plus (48), was third in rushing touchdowns (15) - all tops by a rookie rusher - and was sixth in rushing average (5.1) in 2016.

In 2017 Elliott has 191 carries for 783 yards and eight touchdowns.

In his first season, Elliott produced seven 100-yard rushing games - most by a Cowboys rookie, tied for seventh by a league rookie all-time and tied for the most in the NFL in 2016.

In 2017 he has added four more 100-yard outings to give him 11 for his career for fifth all-time in team history.

Ezekiel Elliott won the NFL's rushing title in 2016 despite only playing in 15 games. Elliott rushed for 1,631 yards and outpaced the second-place rusher, Chicago's Jordan Howard (1,313), by 318 yards. It marked the sixth time that a Cowboy has led the league in rushing, the third overall rusher from Dallas, joining Emmitt Smith (1991-93, 95) and DeMarco Murray (2014), and the first rookie in franchise history to win the NFL rushing title. In NFL history, Elliott became the 16th rookie, sixth in the Super Bowl era - fifth since the NFL merger - and first since Edgerrin James in 1999, to win the league's rushing title:

LIGHTNING ROD

Rod Smith has begun to show sparks of his big-play ability for Dallas in 2017 at the running back position. The third-year veteran had his biggest impact yet in a game at the N.Y. Giants (12/10), rushing six times for 47 yards while also catching five passes for 113 yards - both career-highs - and his first career receiving touchdown on a career-long 81-yard catch-and-run. Both of his scores came in the fourth quarter as he became the first player in NFL history to have both an 80-plus yard touchdown reception and a rushing score in the fourth quarter of a single game.

Smith became the ninth Cowboys running back - 14th time - to notch a 100-yard receiving game, first since Lance Dunbar against Atlanta (9/27/15), and the ninth-highest tally in team history:

CHOOSE YOUR RUNNER

One of the strengths of the Dallas Cowboys is its depth at the running back position. In Dallas' stable of rushers behind 2016 league rushing champion Ezekiel Elliott are a strong mix, with veteran rusher Alfred Morris, and youth and upside with Rod Smith and Trey Williams.

Morris was signed away from divisional rival Washington in 2016 and has served as Elliott's primary back up this season. For his career, he has posted three 1,000-yard seasons, including a Redskins rookie record 1,613 rushing yards in 2012. Smith, the brother of Cowboys linebacker Jaylon Smith, was acquired off waivers from Seattle in 2015 and has seen action mainly on special teams in the last three seasons while flashing as a runner in the preseason and limited snaps in 2017. Williams is in his second stint with the Cowboys, having previously spent time on the club's roster during the 2015 season but didn't play in a game.

THAT'S A BUNCH OF WITT

After coming into the league as Dallas' third round draft pick in 2003, Jason Witten has strung together a Hall of Fame career. He has appeared in the most Pro Bowls by a Cowboys tight end (10, seven consecutive - 2004-10 and three consecutive 2012-14), and is tied for the second-most by any Dallas player in team history, is tops on the club's all-time receptions and receiving yards charts. In 2012 he took the top spot on the club's receptions chart from Michael Irvin at Atlanta (11/4). Witten took 151 games to reach the top of the team's receptions chart which was faster than Irvin (159). When compared to the two other NFL tight ends with at least 750 catches - Tony Gonzalez and Shannon Sharpe - Witten also reached the mark faster - Gonzalez (163 games), Sharpe (169).

He surpassed 1,000 career receptions at Washington (12/7/15) with five catches against the Redskins, reaching that mark in his 203rd game to become the sixth-fastest NFL player to do so, and the fastest tight end.

In 2012 Witten notched a club-record 18-catch game against the N.Y. Giants (10/28). His 18 receptions tied for third in a game in NFL history and were the most by a tight end in league history:

BY DESIGN

Dallas traded up in the 2010 NFL Draft to select Dez Bryant in the first round with the 24th overall pick, the Dallas Cowboys have seen nothing but production from the wide receiver. Bryant has steadily improved in each season of his career while earning three Pro Bowl nods (2013-14, 16).

His most successful seasons came in 2012-14. In 2012 he led the team with 1,382 yards (fourth in club history) and 12 touchdowns (tied for fifth) on 92 catches (seventh), then in 2013 was the team leader in receptions (93) yards (1,233) and touchdowns (13). He continued in 2014 where he left off, leading the team with 88 receptions for 1,320 yards and a franchise-best 16 touchdowns.

Bryant leads the team with 61 catches for 712 yards and six scores in 2017. This season he established a franchise record after hauling in his 72nd touchdown against Washington (11/30).

In his eighth season, Bryant's totals place him in the top-five of the team's career receiving charts with 523 receptions for 7,333 yards and a franchise-record 73 touchdowns:

With the selection of Dez Bryant in the first round of the 2010 NFL Draft, the Dallas Cowboys added to their lineage of home-grown talent at wide receiver. Bryant was issued the jersey number 88 to follow in the footsteps of two of the previous 88s in club history - Drew Pearson (1973-83) and Michael Irvin (1988-99).

In Dallas, Bryant has looked to follow in the footsteps of two former great 88's who finished their careers ranking atop the all-time career receiving lists for the Cowboys. Pearson made 489 receptions (fourth) for 7,822 yards (fourth) and 48 touchdowns (seventh) in 156 career games, while Irvin played in 159 games and caught 750 passes (second) for 11,904 yards (second) and 65 touchdowns (fourth).

In the 2017 season, Bryant has made 61 receptions for 712 yards and six touchdowns. He has 523 receptions (third) for 7,333 yards (fifth) and 73 touchdowns (first) during 110 career games.

Dallas Cowboys linebacker Sean Lee returned to the field in 2015, this time coming back from a torn ACL he suffered in a spring practice that took away his 2014 season. Before that, Lee had bounced back in 2013 to tally a team-best 123 tackles after landing on Reserve/Injured with a toe injury in 2012.

Having manned the middle linebacker spot since his rookie season, Lee moved to a new position in 2015 with a shift over to the weakside spot to further utilize his speed and playmaking ability in the Cowboys 4-3 defense. Lee led the squad with a 156 tackles along with his first career sacks (2.5), a team-high 11 tackles for loss, six pressures, an interception and five pass breakups. He was named to his first Pro Bowl as an injury replacement for Justin Houston (Kansas City).

Lee led the 2016 team with 174 tackles and 12 tackles for loss - both career-highs - along with four quarterback pressures, two pass breakups and a fumble recovery. In 2017 he is currently second on the team with 82 tackles along with a team-high tying eight tackles for loss with two pressures.

JAYLON'S "CLEAR EYE VIEW"

The Dallas Cowboys took a leap of faith when they drafted Notre Dame linebacker Jaylon Smith with their second round selection (34th overall) of the 2017 NFL Draft. The All-American and Butkus award winner suffered a knee injury in the Fiesta Bowl in his final collegiate game, and subsequently missed his entire rookie season rehabbing the injury on Dallas' Reserve/NFI list.

Smith, through his "Clear Eye View" motto, stayed determined and made a miraculous return to the field during the Cowboys 2017 offseason activities, to his first game action in the preseason and finally making his much anticipated debut during the regular season.

Smith currently leads the Dallas defense with 94 tackles - from coaches film - on the 2017 season:

DAN THE MAN

Dan Bailey came to Dallas in 2011 as a rookie free agent and immediately earned his spot as the club's place kicker, finishing the season 32-of-37 (86.5%) on field goals for the second-best field goal percentage by a rookie in franchise history. His 32 field goals made were also a club rookie record. He had a streak of 26 consecutive made which were the most by a rookie in NFL history.

In 2017, Bailey is nine-of-11 on field goals and has made 24 PATs for 51 total points.

For his career, Bailey has converted 180-of-202 tries (89.1%), and his field goals made are the most in team history. Bailey has also hit 274 PAT tries - second in franchise history:

BAILEY FROM 50

For his career, Dan Bailey is 25-of-38 (65.8) from 50-plus yards, and sits atop the club's charts for 50-yarders in a season (six - 2013) and career, while he also boasts a franchise-long 56-yard field goal that he's hit three times, but most recently at Denver (9/17/17). He also boasts the 11th-highest percentage of field goals from this range in NFL history.

Bailey has hit two 50+ field goals in a game four times (three times in 2013), including most recently in the 2016 season opener against the N.Y. Giants (9/11/16), to tie Eddie Murray (at Minnesota, 12/12/93) for the most in a single game.

Bailey was three-of-six in 2016 from 50 yards. He tied his career-long with a 56-yarder at Denver (9/17) for the 2017 season.

GAME-WINNING KICKS

In his rookie season, Dan Bailey was called upon six times to win or tie the game with his foot. Four times he came through for Dallas. Bailey's four game-winning field goals were the most by a Dallas Cowboy in a single season and the most by a rookie in NFL history.

In 2012 Bailey had four opportunities to do the same, and he came through in three games including two in overtime. He added one game-winner in 2013 with a 35-yarder at the N.Y. Giants (11/24).

Bailey was one-of-two during the 2014 season.

His only game-winner of the 2015 season came at Washington (12/7) where he nailed a 54-yarder - tied for the second-longest kick of his career, and the longest game-winner of his career.

In team history, there have now been 39 instances in which a kicker was true on a game-winning field goal with 2:00-or-less left in the fourth quarter or in overtime.

Bailey has rang true with 10 game-winners - and a franchise-best five in overtime - to serve as the most in team history:
